

100+ Funding Search Engines, Scholarships & Grant Opportunities

The following financial opportunities are offered to students who intend to pursue and complete college degrees. Although most of these scholarships have stated deadlines for submitting them and some of them have passed, we encourage you to apply as early as possible for the next available award cycle. When reviewing equivalent applications, sometimes the award will be given to the earlier one received.

Track your Applications and Correspondence—As you apply for multiple scholarships, you will notice similarities among them that will make the process easier if you use the same content repeatedly—but keep a record of what you send and to whom. It is entirely possible to obtain full funding for all of your college experience from undergraduate entry to earning your doctorate. It is purely a numbers game—the more scholarships you apply for, the better your chances.

Guidance Resources—Many of the websites in the first section will offer tutorials, videos, and even tracking software to prepare for scholastic tests, apply for scholarships, upload requested documentation once, and track deadlines for submissions and applications. Because they will tend to have access to the same scholarship details, it is overkill to use more than a few, but if you don't get the results you want, add another and drop the ones that you don't find helpful.

Several online financial aid calculators like the FinAid's QuickEFC calculator and CollegeBoard's College Financing Calculators can help you better understand the costs and guide your steps for successfully getting from where you are to where you want to be.

Ask your way to success!— In addition to the listings below, remember to ask locally among your school advisors, family members, employers (your parent's and yours), church groups, sororities, fraternities and your family's social and political organizations. There are funds out there—your challenge will be to *find them!*

Last Tips:

- Create a text file where you keep the information you'll need (grades, extracurricular activities, volunteer activities, clubs, sports, awards, hobbies, personal reference contacts (ASK them first and ask what they'll SAY!), essays, and career-related experiences you have had. Send it to yourself with each major update to create a copy of each version as backup. This will be the document of your own responses that you can copy and paste from when filling out scholarship applications.
- If you already know which institution(s) you'd like to attend, search their website and ask a counselor about scholarships that are only at those individual schools.
- Be SURE to have your advisor and a grammar teacher read through it for spelling or phrasing errors. Again, if two applications are equal, one of the things that can kill your chances is bad grammar or spelling.
- Pace yourself! There are a LOT of possibilities for funding! Set a specific amount of time that you will spend on searching, then take a break to stretch and walk around!

SEARCH SERVICES *CAUTION*

A measure of caution is wise when using scholarship search websites. Like any website, only some of them are legitimate, and of the ones that are, some provide the service at a cost. Remember, just like any website that requests personal information, you need to take a good look at who is offering the service. If there is something odd about the website or it was not one you have heard recommended by trusted sources, take a closer look.

"Phishing" is a kind of online fraud that involves getting you to disclose secure information under false pretenses, usually promising big rewards.

Fraudulent websites will:

- Charge a fee or ask for banking information. There are enough free and legitimate scholarship websites to finance multiple degrees, and the paid services frequently have exactly the same information. Legit scholarships do not need a credit card number to verify your identity or hold a scholarship for you, nor will they ask for payments by Western Union or bitcoin (untraceable).
- Tell you that you won a scholarship that you never applied for—then ask for processing fees. Another scam is to send you a check for more than is needed (a forgery), but ask you to send them payment for the excess by a faster method. The forgery, would later be rejected by your bank with an added fee for the bad check.
- Say that they are a tax-exempt scholarship foundation, but they are not in the IRS list (<https://www.irs.gov/charities-non-profits/tax-exempt-organization-search>).
- Claim to have high success rates, guarantees, or exclusive access to scholarships.
- Often have a lookalike addresses with ads, popups, and fake links in them (like "collegeboard.ra" or "stanford.edu.com" or "fafsa.com" instead of "collegeboard.org," "stanford.edu" or "fafsa.gov"). The legitimate organizations and agencies will tend to be more among the .org, .gov, .edu, and some .com domains. Combination domains (scholars.edu.za) are often fake. Websites created under web addresses of foreign countries (like ones ending in .za, .ra, .ne, etc.) should NOT be easily trusted.
- Usually have misspellings and bad phrasing, like the page was created by someone who is not very familiar with American English.
- Ask you to download a certain file (not a .doc or .pdf) which will need your computer's password to activate. These can contain micro-programs to collect information from your computer and the keys you press on the keyboard, including banking passwords.
- Frequently use disposable email addresses like bob@yahoo.com or annie@clickmail.net for their contact information, instead of setting up a paid email service with the site's domain name, like legitimate companies and agencies do.
- Not bother having multiple social media accounts where people can visibly complain about bad experiences to others.
- Use pressure or threats to make you to act quickly (not to be confused with regular deadlines for applications).

Legitimate websites will have secure pages (their addresses begin with "https://"), or at least it is secure on the web page where your information is requested. They have a "closed padlock" icon to the left of the https address in the browser. Do NOT trust your private information with a web page that is not secure!

Services that claim to be free like fastweb.com and moolahspot.com (note the ".com") will often sell your contact information to third-party companies for marketing purposes. Know this before you sign up. For this, you might also create an alternate email account for use with these websites so that you can use their resources without clogging the inbox of your main career/correspondence email account.

Things you'll need to do to prepare– As early as the summer before your junior year, begin to collect your best essays, and discuss them with English & Grammar teachers. **DO** ask them to make suggestions for you to make when you rewrite them—more than once. Unless you have access to a scholarship judge, your teachers will be the best sources for useful critiques. Consider them your “*Power Posse*”—the ones who are most likely to know what you need to succeed academically and will nudge you when needed.

Expect that essays are required or recommended for scholarship and college applications, and that you will be asked to write about a problem, failure or turning point that taught you an important life lesson, something that captivates you for hours, or about an event or person in your life that helped make you who you are and realize who you want to be. It should demonstrate significant introspection, or perhaps a pivotal point in your maturity. Even if the question focuses on why you want to attend that school, the essay should tell how it connects to your interests and life goals. Ask your Power Posse to tell you if it sounds too ordinary, cliché, or not sincere enough.

Write new essays regularly on different topics that come from suggestions at the different websites, and have them reviewed by your Power Posse. Be extremely organized in keeping and labeling each file and versions. As an essay is developed, you don't want to risk sending an older undeveloped one with errors.

Consider working in a group!– There are many funding resources and going through them can be done faster by more people. Remember, sharing information means that you can find more scholarships in less time. As your group reads the details, they can sort out which ones connect with each other's interests faster.

Allow Enough Time to Do It Well– Give yourself at least a week or two for writing an essay, having it reviewed, rewriting, having it reviewed again, and completing the rest of the application. Rarely will you have any opportunity to correct anything after the first submission, and you will lose the appearance of being prepared and careful. Assume that the people who receive and review your applications and documents have long memories.

DO NOT COPY AND PASTE content you find online into your submitted documentation—especially with essays, reports, or sample research papers! There are several software applications that will “read” essay submissions, search millions of websites for phrasing that sounds similar, and rate each entry on how likely it is original content and not plagiarized. Any of the types of plagiarizing (ref) is reason to be disqualified from their consideration forever.

Now that you've read all the warnings, you're ready to get started!

(IF you find a dead or fraudulent link, please let us know, and we will revise the list. Even if a link doesn't work, it can tell you the name of a company, bank or organization that you can Google for current scholarship information.)

The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)— is the BEST overall starting point for qualifying for scholarships and grants, and it is usually a required step in college financial aid processes. Your Social Security Number, your family's IRS returns, bank statements, and government-issued ID will be required to create an account.

*How to Report a Scholarship Scam

If you encounter a scholarship scam, report it to the following law enforcement authorities. By reporting a scholarship scam in a timely manner, you may help save other students from becoming victims of scholarship scams. Report the scam to the National Fraud Information Center (NFIC) at 1-800-654-7060 or visit www.fraud.org.

The NFIC shares information with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and state attorney generals. You can also report the scam directly to the FTC by filing a complaint form or calling 1-877-FTC-HELP (1-877-382-4357). The FTC published an article about scholarship and financial aid scams, as well as an annual report to Congress about scholarship scams.

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service considers scams sent by postal mail as mail fraud. You can report such scams using the Postal Crime Hotline online complaint form at USPS.com, or by calling 1-877-876-2455 (say "fraud") or call 1-800-654-8896.

To report fraud involving federal student aid funds, such as FAFSA fraud rings, contact the Office of the Inspector General at the U.S. Department of Education by calling 1-800-MIS-USED (1-800-647-8733) or filing a report using the OIG Hotline.

The College Scholarship Fraud Prevention Act of 2000 (P.L. 106-420) created enhanced penalties for scholarship fraud to encourage law enforcement to prosecute scholarship scams.
